Twenty Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year A

In this Sunday's Gospel, Matthew 20:1-16a, Jesus teaches us through a parable about the Kingdom of Heaven.

The parable is about a landowner who hires workers to work in his vineyard at different hours of the day. Those who start early in the morning with a promise of a just day's wage assume that they will receive more than those hired at the last minute. It is a fair thought but that is not how it turns out. All the workers receive the same wages. Confronted by the early workers, the owner does not give in: *"My friend, I am not cheating you. Did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what is yours and go. What if I wish to give this last one the same as you?" (Mt 20: 13-14)*

Many of us might reason similarly. Those who worked the whole day would have the right to expect a little more in payment. And we believe that is a fair game. Moreover, this is our way of thinking, doing and our rules: when we work hard for something, we have a right to expect something.

However, our ways of thinking, doing, ruling are not God's ways. Our thoughts about fairness and mercy are not God's thoughts. The prophet Isaiah told us about this merciful God of ours long ago in the Old Testament (first reading). *"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts." (Is 55: 8-9)*

Indeed the teachings of our God sometimes are hard for us to understand fully. The fact is this we with our limits have no ability to measure the justice and the mercy of God. His act of mercy is beyond our perceptions of divine mercy. Then, let us all know this reality: with God everybody has the right to receive God's favor and love. And that the work of redemption of our Lord Jesus Christ is for the salvation of the whole humankind.

If we identify ourselves with the early workers who faithfully work in God's vineyard, we are blessed because God is there always in our lives. If we see ourselves as the late comers into the vineyard, we are also blessed by a merciful God. So, let us believe and profess that our God is kind and merciful, slow to anger, and rich in compassion.

RCIA and the Search for God

Are you searching for God? Do you, or someone you know, feel a calling toward the Catholic Church?

RCIA—the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults—is a program for adults who are considering entering the Catholic Church and have not been baptized, for baptized non-Catholic Christians who wish to join the Catholic Church, or for baptized Catholics who wish to complete their Sacraments of Initiation (Holy Eucharist and Confirmation). We also welcome Catholics who would like to study their faith more deeply.

In RCIA, we talk about the presence of God in our lives and in the world. We share our faith and pray. We study Scripture and how it speaks to us today. We learn about the Church, its beliefs, and its sacraments. We explore what it means to be Catholic and to live a Christian life. We learn from each other as we journey together on a pilgrimage of faith.

RCIA sessions will begin in early October. We are determining if the sessions will be in-person with social distancing, remote, or a hybrid. If you have a preference, please let us know. Your input is valuable to us.

Please consider RCIA if you have been contemplating entering the Church or completing your Sacraments of Initiation. You may know someone who has inquired about the Church or has not completed the Sacraments of Initiation. Spread the good news!

FOCUS ON THE WORD

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

If I work for five hours, I expect to get paid for five hours. If I work for two, I expect to get paid for two. What if we worked for a company that paid everyone the same amount regardless of how long they worked? How would we feel going home with the same pay for working eight hours as my co-worker did for working only two hours? Secular wisdom would have a huge problem with this and a visit to the Labor Board would quickly pursue. But this is God's wisdom and God's ways.

We sometimes think that if we pray more, better, or more fervently and go over and above with the practice of our faith, God will somehow reward us and present us with some kind of merit badge. We are so wrong. Spiritual practices have only one true purpose: to deepen our love for God. In deepening our love for God, we also increase our ability to see God's presence around us, living life more purposefully and contemplatively. What if God chooses to treat someone who has come on the scene of faith later in life the same as someone who has devoted their whole lives to it? Does it really matter? If we have the merit badge notion of faith, we can find ourselves feeling a little arrogant and even jealous of folks who have not followed the same path that we have. We can even see ourselves as the privileged few who have a corner on the faith and fully possess it.

That thinking doesn't square with God. God is all about mercy in abundance and is ready to take anyone to himself regardless of when they come. He is only happy that they have come home and delights in their return. After all, if you really and truly love someone, does it matter what they will give you in return or what you receive as a benefit? If relationships were assessed based upon productivity, they would lack authentic love. We invest too much self interest in our prayer and neglect to see it as an opportunity to pursue our Lover and deepen the intimate bond we have with God.

When we breathe our last, all that is of consequence is union with God. If my love for God is real, I am going to want to live the Gospel, abide by the commandments, practice my faith, forgive and love my neighbor, and care for the environment, regardless of how much time it takes or benefits me. We want God to think and behave as we do, and in doing so, we set ourselves up for disappointment. God has a totally different agenda and that's okay.
